



CDA at a Glance:

CDA is a highly secular, Non-Partisan, Non-Government Development Organization (NGDO) established in the years 1985-1986 in the North Western Part of Bangladesh. CDA is a conflict & problem learning and repeatedly as a facilitating organization to organize and mobilize the rural landless excluded and powerless people for engaging in a village based community organization and gradually institutionalized vertically as a socio-political frame-work by the side of the local Government tiers to deal with the issues of fundamental needs and rights with social mobilization for Agrarian Reform and for implementing self-planned activities by themselves ensuring access to land rights, land use and to tap the other resources are locally available.

CDA is a renowned grassroots organization working on some particular agrarian development issues, which are quite different from those of other profit and non-profit NGOs/CSOs in Bangladesh. CDA has involvement at local, national, regional, and international levels through networking and alliance building with likeminded organizations. CDA gradually has been shifted its strategic position from charity to a Right based Organization now facilitating among the poorest, landless and marginal farmers along with the plain land indigenous people (IP) including the differently able men, women & youth with a view to empower, ensure Human Rights from its inception.



1.1 Sustainable Organization

Sustainable organization refers to the CDA's village-based landless Poor People Organization (PO), where cluster (para)- based small groups/samities of men and women are federated. It is a **Parallelogram structure and convergence mechanism** from local government from ward to a constituency level. This process facilitates the formation of a tripartite alliance between government, People Organizations (POs) and CDA. CDA's sustainable organization process is gender sensitive. Some special approaches are implemented for the empowerment of both men and women through Grass-root level Mobilization, Movement & Women focused Gender-sensitiveness activities. CDA has been facilitating various types of Inputs to strengthening the Village Based Peoples Organization (POs):

CDA facilitates to mobilize Landless poor people in a para-level groups/samities, for the formation of village based Landless Peoples Organization (PO).

Raising awareness on the Human Rights related issues in their respective villages/national and local contexts.

Facilitate to identify khas land, mobilize their own resources, develop integrated planning and mapping, and build local networks for engagement of civil society.

Capacity building training for human resource development of People's Organizations:

Provide training on sustainable organization and alternative leadership development, local government services, land rights and the role of land administration, financial management, land rights, land laws and land administration, and advocacy & mobilization.

Facilitated to conduct Meetings with union parishad chairmen, meetings with Local administration officials to ensure the accessibility towards social safety net services.



INSTITUTION BUILDING:

Institution Building is an united platform of the landless disempowered & poor peasants instituted by their own initiatives in a village as titled Peoples Organizations (PO) where the landless are in a process of building leadership towards ensuring People Centered Land Governance and with a view to protest against the injustices and securing the tenure rights to establish the fundamental Human Rights which includes basically the idea of Land Rights as the Human Rights towards sustainable livelihood.

CDA"s Institution process is a unique solidarity building process with the resource poor within from the village to a constituency level vertically led by Peoples organizations with six tires parallel to six different Local Government Administrative levels with a view to promote a transparent convergence mechanism in distributing khas land and other natural and public resources. Community solidarity inspires people in changing their oppressed situation by applying their own knowledge-power-strength and assist to promote an applied sociopolitical framework instituted with the human rights culture and values can ensure protection, respect and remedies through such a potential mechanism which is viable to make the effective social mobilization and people centered advocacy from the grassroots level.

Quarterly & Yearly Coordination meeting of Union Landless Coordination Committee (ULCC)

Union Landless Coordination Committee (ULCC) is a tires of Parallelogram which is parallel structure of Peoples organization to the Union Parishad the lowest tires of Local government. The committee consist with 3 leaders of each Peoples Organization with in a Union. The main objective of the Committee is to unite the members of all POs within the Union and negotiated the Local Government to ensure the social safety net services. Fulfilling the purpose during this reporting period total 308 quarterly Coordination meeting & 77 Yearly Coordinating meeting was held in CDA's working area. Total 1472 Union based landless leaders were participated in those meeting along with Union Parishad Chairman and Ward Members.





Quarterly & Yearly Coordination meeting of Thana Landless Coordination Committee (TLCC)

Thana/Upozilla Landless Coordination Committee (ULCC) is the 4th tire of the Parallelogram of Peoples Organization. The committee consist with 2 leaders of each ULCC and working within the area of Upa-Zilla (sub-district) parallel to another step of Local Government which Upozila Parishad the 2nd tires of Local government. Such a parallel structure is instituted by the Peoples Organization for the purpose to promote and strengthen the PO leaders to raise their voice against the injustice and inequalities as well as make coordination with the Upozilla administration in favor of their rights. Fulfilling the purpose during this reporting period total 44 quarterly Coordination meeting & 11 Yearly Coordinating meeting was conducted by the TLCC with the facilitation of CDA.



Quarterly & Yearly Coordination meeting of District Landless Coordination Committee (DLCC)

This is the 5th tire of People's Organization building process facilitated by CDA which is parallel to the District Level Local Government Administration to establish linkage, Negotiation and Convergence mechanism for advocacy to reduce the disadvantages and complicacies in khas land settlement among the landless poor and for ensuring other government services. Keep that in mind Thakurgaon District Landless Coordination Committee conducted 4 quarterly meeting and Dinajpur District Landless Coordination Committee conducted 4 Quarterly meeting

Quarterly & Yearly Coordination meeting of Federation of Peoples Organization (FPOs)

Federation of Peoples Organization is the 6th tier of the Institution Building process of the POs, the highest body for the mass mobilization for policy advocacy formed as a people centered advocacy institution parallel to the constituency level (Member of Parliament). The main purpose of the tire is

influence the MPs for pro-people Policy making and formulation the laws for food governance as a part of Agrarian Reform.

Quarterly & Yearly Coordination meeting of Women Federation of Peoples Organization (WFPOs)

Federation of Peoples Organization is a special tire side by side of FPOs. This committee consist only with the Women leader of ULCC (union based tire) for the purpose of women empowerment and also influence the Member of Parliament to formulate and reform

laws for the favor of women's sustainability and gender equality and

ensure access to the land and natural resources.

1.2 Land Rights as Human Rights

The majority of the rural poor in Bangladesh are landless. Most of them are living in Northern region of the country. The lack of land ownership and inequalities in access to land poverty, hunger, and disempowerment resulted to the violation of human rights and bad governance. Gender inequality in land rights are the cause of domestic violence. No legislative protection and recognition of indigenous people's right upon their ancestral land.

The Land administration system in Bangladesh is not well-defined. It is beset with multiple defects and problems. About 80 percent of criminal offenses are stemmed from land disputes. A majority of them are the landless and rural people, who are deprived from their rights to justice due to their financial stringencies and lack of united power among landless people.

CDA is accountable to facilitate community-based peoples' organizations to support landless local communities to secure Khas land. The peoples' organizations and CDA facilitated to support legal action for the protection of the local communities for their land rights.

CDA mobilized local communities to form POs to demand their access to land rights and others agrarian rights and services. The POs organized the local communities 'to raise voice and created a basis of legal action.

After analyzing all possible tenure systems by other stakeholders to found their land claims, the local communities occupied Khas lands (housing & agriculture) and water bodies that rightfully belonged to them and persevered through intimidation by the local elites. The occupation of Khas land and water bodies resulted in local elites claiming ownership of the land whilst relying on fake title deeds.

Results of Land Rights Competent by the village based Peoples Organization (PO):

- 616 landless, poor, and vulnerable families were able to access homestead khasland for housing. The total land area covered 21.93 acres.
- 284 families have been assured possession on government Khasland for agricultural farming. The total land area covered 34.78 acres.
- 192 families ensured access to water bodies for fish culture.
 The total land area covered by this lease is 10.11 acres.
- Out of the total 1092 families, 78 were Indigenous families, 17 were disabled families, and 58 were women headed families.
- Land rights were ensured for a total of 1092 landless poor families, which broadly refers to the right to access, use, and control over land, as well as land tenure security.



Access to the Khasland through the Institutional Process

CDA is accountable to facilitate community-based peoples' organizations to support landless local communities to secure Khas land. The peoples' organizations and CDA facilitated to support legal action for the protection of the local communities for their land rights. CDA mobilized local communities to form POs to demand their access to land rights. Having the facilitation of institution building process 42 landless families of the people's organization in Gaganpur, Basudebpur and Akargram of Biral-Bochaganj region have recovered 3.03 acres of agricultural khas land and there started jointly cultivating.

The movement of the recovery for that agricultural khas land was started since 2016. In that time the recovered land fallen used, that's why two (2) poor landless people tried to use the land for cultivation. But suddenly a renowned industrial groups, illegally occupied the land with some local influential people. The landless people who used to cultivate paddy and secured food twice a day were evicted from the 3.03 acres of government khas land was evicted and tangled up a signboards in the name of the Company. Then the landless members of the People's organizations (POs) started searching to verify whether the land really belongs to the company or not. The landless people of three villages find out the map-ledger, records and related documents of the land from sub district and through the judicial analysis it is came to know that the land (JL No. 138, Akragram Mouza) is absolutely Khas Land. After knowing the real status of the identified land the Members of the People Organizations (POs) and the local people were united stared to plan how to reclaim this land.

On the other hand, the company without informing the government, they gradually started changing the land classification with the overall status of the land, started building roads and ghats, turning the land into land which is illegal under the Government Khas Land Act. The influence of the local land grabbers resisted by the landless people to recover into the land.

Analyzing the situation the members of the three organizations arranged a meeting, discussed, and explained to the members that the right to government agricultural khas land belongs only to the landless as per the government policy. If the landless people rescue that agricultural khas land, their scarcity/poverty will be alleviated. The member realized that if they jointly cultivate the agricultural khas land, then the 42 families of Gaganpur, Basudebpur and Akar villages will be able to eat well twice a day. After various perspectives, the members of the People's Organization took the initiative to rescue the khas land.



It was first applied to the industrial company that the landless deserve this Khas Land because only the landless have the right to legally enjoy government land. But the Company did not respond to this proposal and forcibly occupied it. Then the landless people set with the local human rights activists, the human rights organization CDA, and with the likeminded civil society members to get suggestion. Having proper guidance they informed Biral Upazila Parishad (sub district) administration. But, the Upazila Parishad administration did not pay attention to the words of the landless and did not provide any assistance. Having no support from the Upazila Parishad administration, the members of the People's Organization started patrolling day and night in the land area. Unified at all times, there were at least 10/15 members guarding it at all times so that the Company cannot change the image of the agricultural khas land.

In the end, the landless members of the three Peoples Organizations went to the Additional District Administrator -ADC (Revenue) of Dinajpur district when the landless people did not get any cooperation from them even after informing the Upazila Parishad administration. On behalf of the Landless people Mahbub Alam, General secretary of Janasanghat Oikya Parishad (FPOs), explained to the District Administrator that, as per the map-ledger/khatian, records and related documents, the Land is Khas and the land grabbers had been grabbing the agricultural khasland since five years. The Company make fake documents and papers and said that they have leased the land from the government. When they asked to show the documents they showed fake documents along with fake record etc. After critically analyzed the papers, documents that have been shown by Pran-RFL were proved all are fake. The upazila administration is silent on the issue because they are corrupted and received large amount of money from the Company along with all other influential people including local government representative.

After a long movement of 5 years since 2016 the 42 landless families of three people's organizations, including Gaganpur, Basudebpur, and Akargram, able to save and recover the 3.03 acres of agricultural khas land in February 2021. Mahbub Alam, general secretary of Janasanghat Oikya Parishad/FPOs, said now no third party can claim the land except the government.

Lastly, it can be said that it was a great example of united organizational movement. Through a successful movement and determination and fight the landless have been able to establish their rights. In this movement CDA's role was only to facilitate the landless people to rescue the khas land in favor of the landless poor, according to state policy. CDA has provided guidance and discussions in various ways to get this khasland legally.

1.3 Agrarian Reform

The Landless poor get priority in distribution of Government Khasland but the distribution system does not function in favor of the landless poor through the link of the elites with the power structure and state functionaries.

Dinajpur and Thakurgaon districts are one of the plain agricultural land & productive and rice growing area in Bangladesh. But the control and ownership of agricultural lands in the districts are only with 30% of the population. The remaining 70% population does not have own land and living without access to other resources. Considering the issue of reducing inequalities and poverty alleviation of this large population, the long-term priority program, Plan-implementation along with the new forward looking strategy for policy reforms are essential. CDA's agrarian reform program considered two things, one is Land tenure such as identification of policy option, distribution of khasland with tenure security among landless, Land rights of religious & ethnic minorities and women's access to land rights, and another one is agrarian support services and inclusive legislative formulation by the state functionaries along with the policy makers.

CDA is committed to organize the landless peasants to build the self-help organization in the villages to initiate their agrarian rights through rallies, human chain, and submission of memorandum, media campaign, face to face dialogues, lobby and advocacy not only for land reform but also for the agrarian reforms with social-public policy recommendations, by the landless people's organization to ensure rights and long-term food security for the rural poor. 

Memorandum submitted to State Authority and to the Policy Makers through the concerned local Government Administration upon Rights based issues and the mitigation of the COVID-19 crisis.

During the fiscal year 2020-2021 and COVID-19 lockdown period, the leaders from the tiers of "PARALLEGRAM" are assembled and submitted memorandums to the policy makers to consider the realities in development contexts from the Grassroots level.

A total of 74 Memorandums were submitted addressed to **the Prime Minister** through the Member of Parliament and Sub District Authority by the Federation of Peoples Organizations (FPOs), Jano-Nari Okkya Parisad & Thana/Upazila Landless Coordination Committees (ULCC) from 8 constituencies in Dinajpur and Thakurgaon districts. The significant demands raised by the Landless people are as follows:

Women's access to equal land rights and recognize the women as farmers working in agriculture field with equal daily wages are demanded.

Cancel the clause 'Widow must have a son for the eligibility of having Kash Land' from the Kash Land distribution Policy.

Gear-up the land disputes settlement of land disputes among the victim landless families by setting up the special mechanism as per the Government legislation.

Government must take initiative to recover the Khas land which is still occupied illegally by the land grabbers and be distributed to the landless local tillers.

Ensure Implementation of the Agricultural Land Management Policy of 1984 and 1997 to ensure sustainable livelihood of rural landless.

Be ensured food assistance to the landless and jobless poor families during the COVID-19 pandemic.

Be Stopped harassment, complexities and corruption from the Local government offices in accessing social safety net services.

People's Organizations (POs) are transformed into Mass People's Cooperatives (JANO- SAMOBAY) structure.

With post-independence mainstream development, the focus was on poverty alleviation through cooperatives. In the evolution of the country, the issue of cooperatives has faded to some extent. Due to the small size of the farm, productivity is not going to increase at a marginal level. There is an opportunity to play a big role in the market of agricultural products and cooperatives. The existing co-operative system faces the challenge of including the resource-poor, landless, marginalized, and traditional groups. Therefore, it is necessary to amend the law for the development of cooperatives. Cooperatives need to be developed and reformed to reduce the exploitative poverty of the market system. Mass People Cooperatives (Jano-Samobay) need to be formed to increase market penetration, create equal opportunities and increase competitiveness. However, in this case, we have to build cooperatives with the grassroots people. There is a need for a completely separate commission. This commission will think about economic reform, law reform, social and cultural issues. Many faculties can work in Mass People Co-operatives (Jano-Samobay) initiatives and lead to self-reliance. Cooperatives will work at the grassroots as an autonomous independent structure. In order to ensure independence, to lift people out of poverty, to increase their power, we must build a cooperative-based structure. This should be considered as a long-term nation building process.

A total of 48 People Organizations (POs) in Dinajpur district 23 and Thakurgaon district 25 have been transformed as a *mass people cooperative (Jano-samobay) based structure*. As a result, landless poor and marginalized people have been able to get involved in the production process through access and participation in government resources at the local level. Such as: khas land, khas pond, private land and cooperative services of various departments of local government. Among the resource-poor people of the village who have joined this mass people's cooperative, many of them have overcome poverty.



The picture view is of the Kismot Rohamotpur Agriculture Cooperative of landless and marginal. They have arranged a lease contract for 1.80 acres of agricultural land on a yearly basis. The annual lease value is BDT-60,000.

FOOD SECURITY PROJECT FOR THE PLAIN LAND INDIGENOUS PEOPLE (IP)

The integrated income generating activities under the CDA's SOLAR program are being implemented in some vulnerable IP villages in the Northwestern part of the country. These villages are very scattered and disorganized who are fighting against hunger, living with insecurities and landlessness. Given the circumstances, CDA provided financial and technical assistance to 24 IP families of Mukundopur village, which is located in Veail union, Chirirbandor upozila, Dinajpur district. One of the goals of the project is to eliminate hunger and provide a secure livelihood for the people of the plains.

1.5 Activity of Differently Able Department

CDA facilitates organizing differently able people in a District Federation where girls, youths, men, and women from vulnerable groups, including IP and different ethnic groups, have been promoted from the grassroots levels to the district level since 2013. The focus of CDA's Differently Able Department activities in FY 2020-2021 was to assist those with disabilities who are vulnerable to winter colds to obtain winter clothing, Raise health awareness to protect people with disabilities from the COVID-19 virus, Capacity building of the disabled and implementation of regular activities of the Federation of Differently Able.

The district disabilities federation implemented following activities through facilitation support by CDA's disable / differently able desk:

Special achievement of the District Disability Federation through advocacy, communication and networking by CDA's differently able desk:

- In Winter warm clothes were provided to 80 people with disabilities in the Dinajpur district through communication with government and non-government organizations.
- Relief assistance was provided to 70 persons with disabilities to address the Covid-19 crisis from private offices and institutions.
- Two women with disabilities received a grant of BDT-15,000 to run a small business through the Uttaran Disability organization. They are now doing small business on their own initiative.
- Allowances for five people with disabilities have been ensured through advocacy in the government's District Social Service office (DSS).
- One person with disabilities received training and a sewing machine for employment, and another child with disabilities received a wheel chair.
- Puja Mohanta, a member of Dinajpur District Disability Federation, was assisted in graphic design training at Dinajpur Technical Education Institute.

Visually impaired "Puja Mohanta" will be as self-reliant as normal human beings.

Introduction: Her name is Puja Rani Mahanta. Her father's name is Prashanta Kumar Mahanta. Her mother's name is Dipti Rani Mahanta. She has two brothers. Her father works in a shop. Her mother is a housewife. She is an inhabitant of Balubari, ward no.8 under the Dinajpur Sadar municipality. She has grown up at his uncle's house since childhood when her parents felt burdened due to financial difficulties and disabilities occurred in the family. She is currently studying at Dinajpur Government Women's College with BA Honors in Social Work.

Type of Disability: She is a visually impaired woman. When she was a child, she could see a little with her left eye due to a mistaken operation due to illness, but she could not see anything with her right eye.

Her wish: She wants to work independently by taking a course in graphics design from the Dinajpur Technical Training Center.

But when it comes to admission, she faced the following challenges:-

Due to visual impairment of one eye, she was not allowed to take admission in Graphics Design course in technical training center.

There is no quota for the disabled in technical training centers.

Teachers at technical training centers are not aware of disability laws.

The role of the CDA's differently abled or disabled Desk in ensuring stakeholder accountability: The Desk is facilitated to get membership in the Dinajpur District Disabled Federation for "Puja Mohanta". The CDA differently able desk organized a short meeting with the head of the Dinajpur technical training center to facilitate the condition of "Puja Mohanta" and explain disability laws and circulars on disabled persons' priorities by the government etc. After discussion, the technical training center authorities allowed her admission. In addition, she received different training from CDA. She has learned to talk about the employment and rights of people with disabilities



The grocery store that was closed due to the COVID-19 lockdown has been resumed.

My house is in Dhumpukur village in Dharmagarh union of Ranishankail upazila of Thakurgaon district. My name is Sri Krishna Ram. I am a member of Dhumpukur Peoples Organization (PO). We hold regular Executive Committee and General Board meetings of the People's Organization (PO). I have a small shop. The shop is located in my village. I sell tea, biscuits and some daily necessities in the shop. The store was shut down due to a lockdown during the COVID period. My family had to go through a lot of hardships as they could not run the shop properly due to lack of money. From CDA's COVID-19 Emergency Response Program, I have received a cheque for the amount of BDT-10,000 in the presence of the Upazila Nirbahi Officer for the recovery of my economic loss. Mr. Dhiren Chandra, President, and Mr. Gulthu Ram, Treasurer of the People's Organization, were present with me. Out of the 10,000 taka, I buy shop goods for 9,500 taka and use 500 taka for vegetable cultivation. My shop is running well now. I am proud that CDA has extended a hand of cooperation to us.








Stakeholders meetings

"Grameen Jono Jubo Songothon" was organized two stakeholder meemiting which was held on June 3, 2021, at the same time in two different districts. One meeting was held at Rajarampur Girls High School, Dinajpur. In this meeting, 61 youths participated from seven Upozila of the Dinajpur diatrict. And another was held at Pirgonj Press Club, Thakurgoan. In this meeting, 46 young people participated from 4 upozilas in Tahkurgaon district. Through the stakeholders' meeting, the Committee of "Grameen Jono Jubo Songothon" was revised. The new committee member believes that it will be more effective to have a network of organizations/institutions that are implementing the activities with a focus on youth in agriculture rather than separately running the activities by different organizations.



Regular platforms meetings by ruralurban youth

Regular youth networking meetings, which are the most important activities of the youth platform. The purpose of the network meeting is to connect rural and urban youth regarding youth, land, and natural resources issues, justice, equality, etc. Considering the purpose, five meetings were organized which were held on 27-03-2021 at Birganj; 29-03-2021 at Ranisankoil; 30-03-2021 at Dinajpur Sadar; 11-04-2021 at Birol and 12-04-2021 at Thakurgoan Sadar. In total 260 youth leaders participated and attending those meeting Youth could able to share their thought and ideas regarding land issues.

Through those meetings, the youth leaders became sensitized and made commitments to get involved in various developmental activities



Regional meeting of youth to exchange knowledge/learnings & Policy/Position Paper finalization

With the facilitation of CDA, the youth group "Grameen Jono Jubo Songothon" organized four regional level meetings. The first meeting was held on 28/05/2021 at Birol NDC Market Hall Room, Birol, Dinajpur, with the participation of 54 youth leaders from Birol, Bochaganj, Birganj and Kharol Upozila. The second, third, and fourth workshops were held on the same day on 30/05/2021, respectively, at Karenthat Degree College Hall room, Chirirbandar, Dinajpur, with the participation of 54 youth leaders; at Ranisankoil Training Center, Mohalbari, Ranisankoil, with the participation of 39 youth leaders; and at Pirgonj Press Club, Thakurgoan, with the participation of 52 youth leaders.

The meetings were conducted following the method of finding out the context of focusing on the issue of youth in land related existing policy of the country. The youth leaders' analyzed the social, political, and economic problems in different ways, focusing on the advantages and disadvantages of youth policy, unemployment issues, and land rights from the perspective of youth. Not only did they find out the problems, but they also tried to find out the way forward and what they needed to do to overcome the situation. Some major findings are given below.

Way forward to overcome the current context:

- 1. Self-employment needed to create for youth as a source of income.
- Must enact policy to access on Identifying khas land to youth to create employment opportunities for the reduction of unemployment.
- Youth should increase evolvement in freelunching and e-commerce business.
- Advocacy campaign formulation through fact finding on a particular case to influence policy makers.
- 5. Raising awareness about land rights and educating youth about land.
- 6. Ensure the involvement of youth in agriculture.





5. JONSREEJON INSTITUTE (JSI) CDA's ICT CENTER [A Technical Institute of CDA]

The Jonsreejon Institute –ICT (JSI-ICT) center is a technical education institute of CDA that has received approval from the Bangladesh Technical Education Board (BTEB) in the fiscal year 2007-2008. The courses that have been approved include: Computer Programing & Graphics Design, Multimedia Trade, and Computer Office Application Trade. The Jonsreejon Institute – ICT center is located in the village of Mokundapur, Rampur-5220, Kaharol, Dinajpur. Nearest



to the famous temple "Kantaziew" (locally called Kantazir Mandir)".

During the fiscal Students enrollment statistics of the JSI-ICT: Computer Office Application Course: 4th Batch (Jan-June 2020)

A total of 40 students are enrolled in the 4th batch course on office applications, which includes 25 boys and 15 girls. 22 students enrolled in the final examination among them, and the remaining students did not attend the final examination due to the unavoidable circumstances of the COVID-19 pandemic. 21 students completed the office application course, where 7 students received grades of A+ and 14 students received grades of A and one student was unsuccessful.

Computer Office Application Course: 5th Batch: (July-Dec 2020)

A total of 17 students are enrolled in the 5th batch course on office applications, including 15 boys and 2 girls. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, enrollment and its promotional campaign were disrupted. As a result, fewer students are enrolled in this batch than in previous batches and also delayed. The tentative exam schedule was declared by the Education Board authorities on September 2021.

Computer Office Application Course: 6th Batch: (Jan-June 2021)

A total of 16 students are enrolled in the 6th batch course on office applications, which includes 12 boys & 4 girls. The exam schedule is declared by the board authorities.



Jonsreejon Institute (JSI): CDA's Central Training Center

The CDA Central Training Centre, namely **the Jonsreejon Institute**, is situated in the valley of the Himalayas, near by the river Dhapa. The distance of the training center is 25 km from Dinajpur town. The campus is designed around a beautiful natural environment. Located in the northwest of Bangladesh.

The Training Centre provides a facility for grassroots women and men from the villages, staff and participants from various national and international non-governmental organizations to take part in and facilitate trainings, conferences and special events. The Training Centre provides institutional support to different organizations and associations, and contributes to the sustainability of CDA. The CDA Central Training Centre is a place where people come to share and exchange ideas and to learn. The environment is gender-friendly and in this place, people with Hindu, Muslim, Christian, Buddhist, Aboriginal or other beliefs can all feel welcome, and live in communal harmony. The total campus is more than 4 acres of land, and it provides residential facilities for 120 women and men. Guests can enjoy food, Lodging, cultural activities, training or meetings within a congenial and secure atmosphere.

Local Culture:

In addition to natural beauty, the region is rich in culture and historical heritage, including peasant struggles. There are many tribal (aboriginal/adibashi) people in the area. The center is minutes away from the historical Kantanagar (Kantaji's) Temple, Nayabad Mosque and small Museum. It is not far from Dinajpur's Raj Bari Compound, and it is close to significant burial sites of freedom fighters that fought for the independence of Bangladesh, and of religious martyrs.

Residential Facilities:

- > 16 Double rooms (2 beds) with attached bath
- > 19 Triple rooms (3 beds) 10 with attached bath
- > 5 semi-VIP rooms with attached bath large groups may use an additional staff dormitory. There are both local and western-style commodes. Special accessible facilities for people who use wheel chairs are available. People with disabilities are welcome at the Training Centre.

Meeting and Training Facilities:

For large meetings and seminars:

> 3 Large hall rooms with seats for 300, 150 and 50 people

For training:

> 3 training rooms (2big, 1 medium size) for groups of 40-60.

For small groups and open discussion:


> 3 shaded open-air round rooms outside to enjoy people the natural environment. Each seats 20 people.

ICT support:

- > All time Wi-Fi connection
- Computer facilities in JSI-ICT center.

Dining and Refreshments:

The Training Centre provides nutritious food and refreshments for guests, which includes seasonal fruits and vegetables cultivated in local villagers. The large dining hall offers a self-service system. 60 people can dine comfortably at the same time. The Centre has a regular menu. Guests may contract for different food menus or special diets. Safe drinking water is available.






